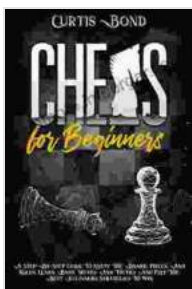

King: The most important piece, representing the leader of the army. The king can move one square in any direction: horizontally, vertically, or diagonally.

Queen: The most powerful piece, capable of moving any number of squares along a rank (horizontally), file (vertically), or diagonal.

Rook: A powerful piece that can move any number of squares along a rank or file.

Bishop: A piece that can move any number of squares diagonally, staying on the same color.

Knight: A unique piece that moves in an "L" pattern - two squares in one direction and then one square perpendicularly. Knights can jump over other pieces.

Pawn: The most numerous piece, with each player having 8 pawns. Pawns normally move forward one square at a time, but they have the option of moving two squares on their initial move. Pawns capture diagonally forward one square.

- Rooks on the corners
- Knights beside the rooks

- Bishops beside the knights
- Queen on its own color (white queen on white square, black queen on black square)
- King beside the queen

The objective of chess is to checkmate the opponent's king. Checkmate occurs when the king is under immediate threat of capture (check) and has no legal moves to escape.

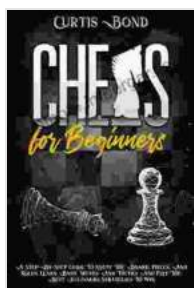

- **En Passant:** A special pawn capture that can occur under specific conditions. When a pawn advances two squares from its starting position and lands beside an opponent's pawn, the opponent has the option of capturing the first pawn "en passant," as if it had only moved one square forward.
- **Promotion:** When a pawn reaches the opposite side of the board, it can be promoted to any other piece (queen, rook, bishop, or knight) of the same color.
